Books made or conceived by artists.

What are artists' books?

Artists' books are books made or conceived by artists.

Artists' books that maintain the traditional structure of a book are often known as book art or bookworks, while those that reference the shape of a book are known as book objects.

"Artists' books are books or book-like objects, over the final appearance of which an artist has had a high degree of control; where the book is intended as a work of art in itself." (Bury, 1995, p.1). Bury, S. (1995) Artists' books: the book as a work of art. 1963-1995. Aldershot: Scholar Press.

UWE Bristol's collection of artists' books is located in filing cabinets in the main part of <u>Bower Ashton Library (City Campus)</u>. The books can be looked at in the library only during library staffed hours (Monday – Friday 08:30 – 17:00).

UWE Bristol has two collections of artists' books:

c.1,300 in Special collections at Bower Ashton Library and c.1,500 in the Centre for Print Research archive.

These are used as teaching, study and research resources and are open for public or study visits.

ARTIST BOOK SUMMARIES

At Tate and elsewhere artist books are typically catalogued in terms of core bibliographic details (place of publication, size of edition etc.), but these catalogue entries rarely provide a sense of what the books are like and often do not assist users who might wish to search a collection thematically.

As part of the 'Transforming Artist Books' Research Network, Tate pilloted the writing of five descriptive texts that combined bibliographic details with descriptive and interpretative commentary similar in tone and format to the summaries written about artworks in Tate's collection. Some of the texts contain artist-generated information and all have suggestions for further reading. New photographs of the books help show their






We collect artists' books and fine press publications from the UK. Our collections also include many important works from the Americas and Europe.

About the collection

These collections reflect the growth and innovation in artists' books over the past 50 years. We hold extensive collections of published works by Ken Campbell, Carolyn Trant, Ron King, Christine Tacq, lan Tyson, Natalie d'Arbeloff, D R Wakefield, and many others.

Our fine press collections date from the late 19th century to the present day, including the Hogarth Press. Old Stile Press. Circle Press, and Enitharmon Editions. We have extensive collections of visual poetry and concrete poetry, including more than 500 publications from Writers' Forum.

We have the largest collection in the world of UK illustrated books, including children's literature and books produced by the Folio Society.

Americas and Europe

Our collections are particularly strong for the Americas, including works by Ulises Carrión, Enrique Chagoya, Guillermo Gómez-Peña, Barbara Hodgson, Sol LeWitt, Angela Lorenz, Edward Ruscha, Cecilia Vicuña and Kara Walker. We also hold a selected sample of miniature books containing publications by Peter and Donna Thomas, Irene Chan, and Midnight Paper Sales & Flaming Cat Press, among others.

The Library holds a large selection of independent fine press books from the Americas, including the Arion Press, Heavenly Monkey, Yolla Bolly Press, Nawakum Press, Ninja Press, The Moving Parts













