


#### My backgrounds

## What does good prison research look like?





#### Good prison research addresses the current sectoral concerns

- Good prison research is grounded in reality:
  - It is situated within the methodology of the research
  - It feeds policymaking processes and vice versa
- The process starts early and is continuous:
  - Planning for the research project
  - Putting together a research proposal
  - Formulating research questions
  - Gaining access to the field
  - Undertaking fieldwork
  - Disseminating the findings



Your research questions articulate some of the issues that we've all been skirting around. We know that there have been austerity measures, reductions in budget, and challenges in prison.

I think many of the people who we work with perhaps haven't even considered the questions that you're asking in your research. I think it's kind of that - what's the question policymakers need answering, what can academics do to help, and what can other supporting entities, like NGOs and international organisations, do to support that?

  - Funders (and the interviewer panel)
  - Department and faculty
  - Research participants
  - Members of the public






Working on the cold face of prison, it's a tedious thing, and it's important that we get to the bottom of why things [in prisons are deteriorating. [S]o this project appealed to me because it attempts to deal with the core problem I think that underlies much of what's been happening over the last eight years.



The impact of what happens in wider society on the criminal justice system and the prison systems [is] a very important issue that's often neglected...a lot of people tend to view [it] as something completely separate and outside of normal society.
