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United Nations Sustainable Development Goals

- Adopted by 193 countries in 2015. The world we want by 2030.
- Developed by largest global consultation ever but low involvement of faith-based organisations.
- Leave No One Behind
- 17 Goals
- 169 Targets
- 247 Indicators
- *aka* Global Goals
- Decade of Action 20-30

Christian Engagement with the SDGs?

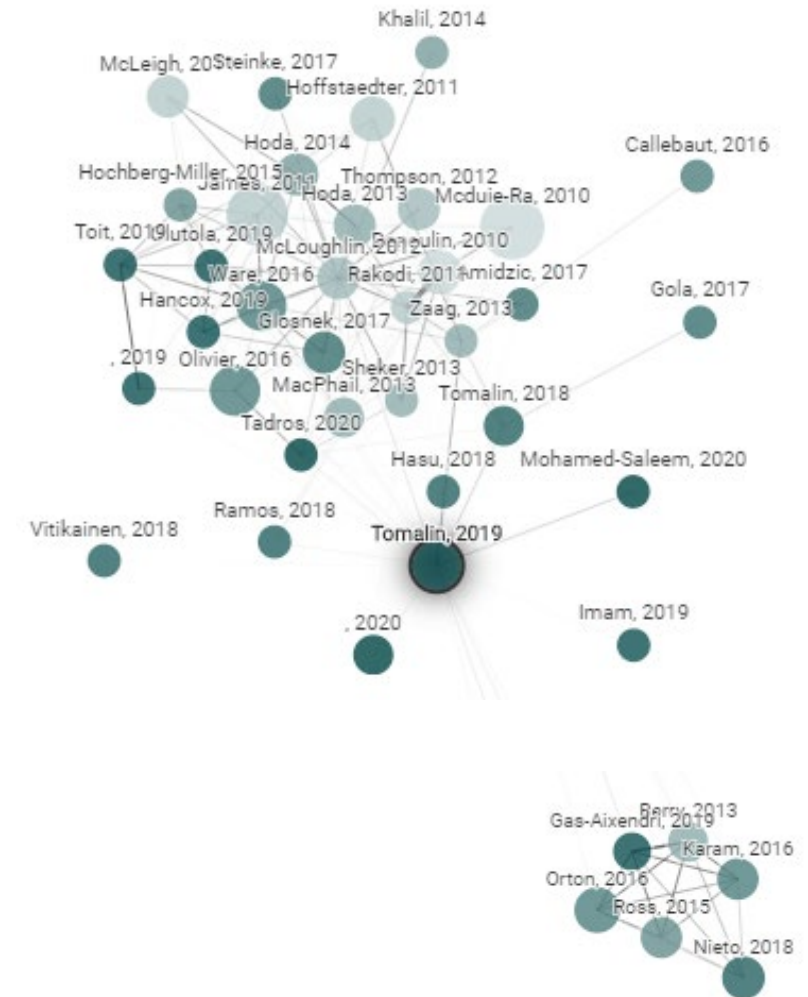
- Research Question: What is the state of Christian engagement with the SDGs? (Focus on the UK)
- Literature Review: Who is already looking at this topic?
- Interviews: with relevant stakeholders engaged with the SDGs
- Website engagement measure:
- What evidence on church websites of engagement? Google search on “sustainable development goals” *site:churchdomain.org*

Potential problems with this approach

- Engagement? Actions which support sustainable development may not be labelled with SDG terminology
- Literature Review: Academic publishing cycle is slow.
- Interviews: selected individuals generally in favour of SDGs. May not be representative.
- Website engagement: Google search counts vary. Page totals imprecise. Websites not always representative of church activity. Individual churches not on major domains.
- The researcher: analysis done by one researcher, no peer review. Researcher is broadly supportive of SDGs.

Literature Review

- SCOPUS "sustainable development goals" AND christian OR church OR faith OR religious = 83 papers + 12 other documents.
- Key researchers: Prof Emma Tomalin, Dr Jörg Haustein. UK Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC)—“Keeping Faith in 2030: Religions and the SDGs.”
- Tomalin, Haustein and Kidy (2019) ‘Religion and the Sustainable Development Goals’
- “Understanding ... the role of faith communities and actors is crucial for sustainable development.” p101
- Seven recommendations including “In building partnerships with faith actors, it is important that they are listened to and included on their terms rather than being instrumentalized to achieve pre-defined development goals.” p115



Literature Review

- Gas-Aixendri and Albareda-Tiana (2018) The role of religion in global sustainability: A study on Catalonia's contribution to sustainable development goals.
- Low visibility of religious contributions. High publicity of religiously-motivated violence.
- Analysed underlying activities found on 449 religious websites in 2015 and allocated to SDGs
- More contributions of a social nature, few related to environment.

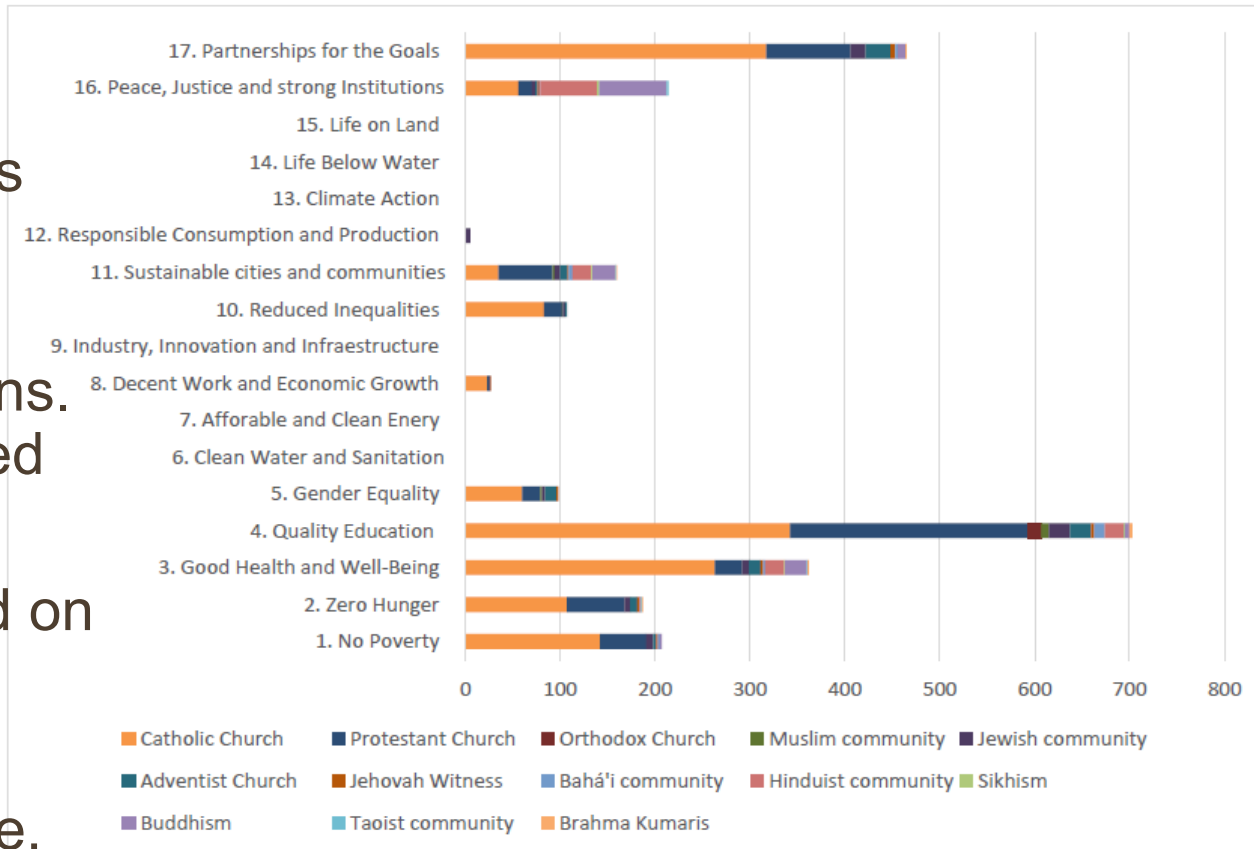


Figure 2. Religious institutions contribution to SDGs

Literature Review

- SDGs as “a new global morality”. (Redo, 2015)
- Role of Faith Based Organisations (FBO) in Sustainable Development
- Contributions to specific SDGs e.g. SDG3 Good Health and Wellbeing
- Highlighting understanding and acting on *Diakonia* e.g. healthcare and education (Leer-Helgesen, 2018)
- Critical engagement with the SDGs e.g. assumed link of consumption and development (Leer-Helgesen, 2018), (Tomalin, Haustein and Kidy, 2019)

SDG Voluntary National Reviews

- Searched the Voluntary National Reviews database for mentions of...
- “Church” or “Christian”: =20 Bahamas, Canada, Denmark, Egypt, Finland, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Indonesia, Ireland, Jamaica, Latvia, Lebanon, Malta, Norway, Singapore, State of Palestine, Sweden, Tonga, Vanuatu
- “Religious”=31
- 197 countries adopted the SDGs

Interviews

- Low awareness in churches of SDGs, particularly UK.
- Widespread misperception that SDGs don't apply to UK.
- Well received when introduced, a sign of hope for the 'big problems' such as poverty.
- More engagement in churches with well developed concept of *diakonia* / community service.
- Some objections encountered by contributors included 'distraction from personal gospel', 'kingdom without the King', secular origin of SDGs.
- International church bodies and development organisations make more extensive use. A common language with Governments and funders.
- Potential for churches to use SDGs to celebrate what they already do.

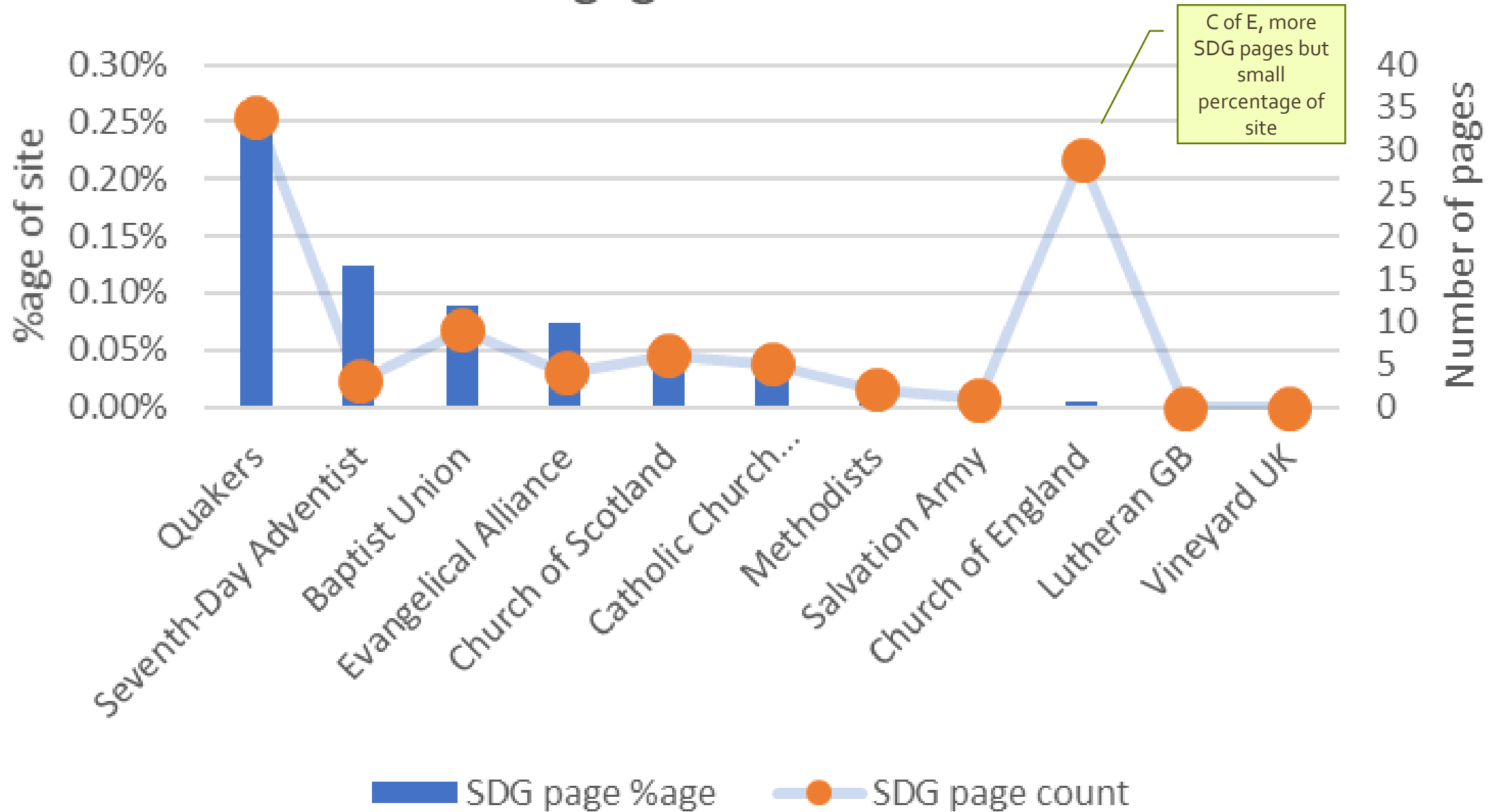

Primary Research

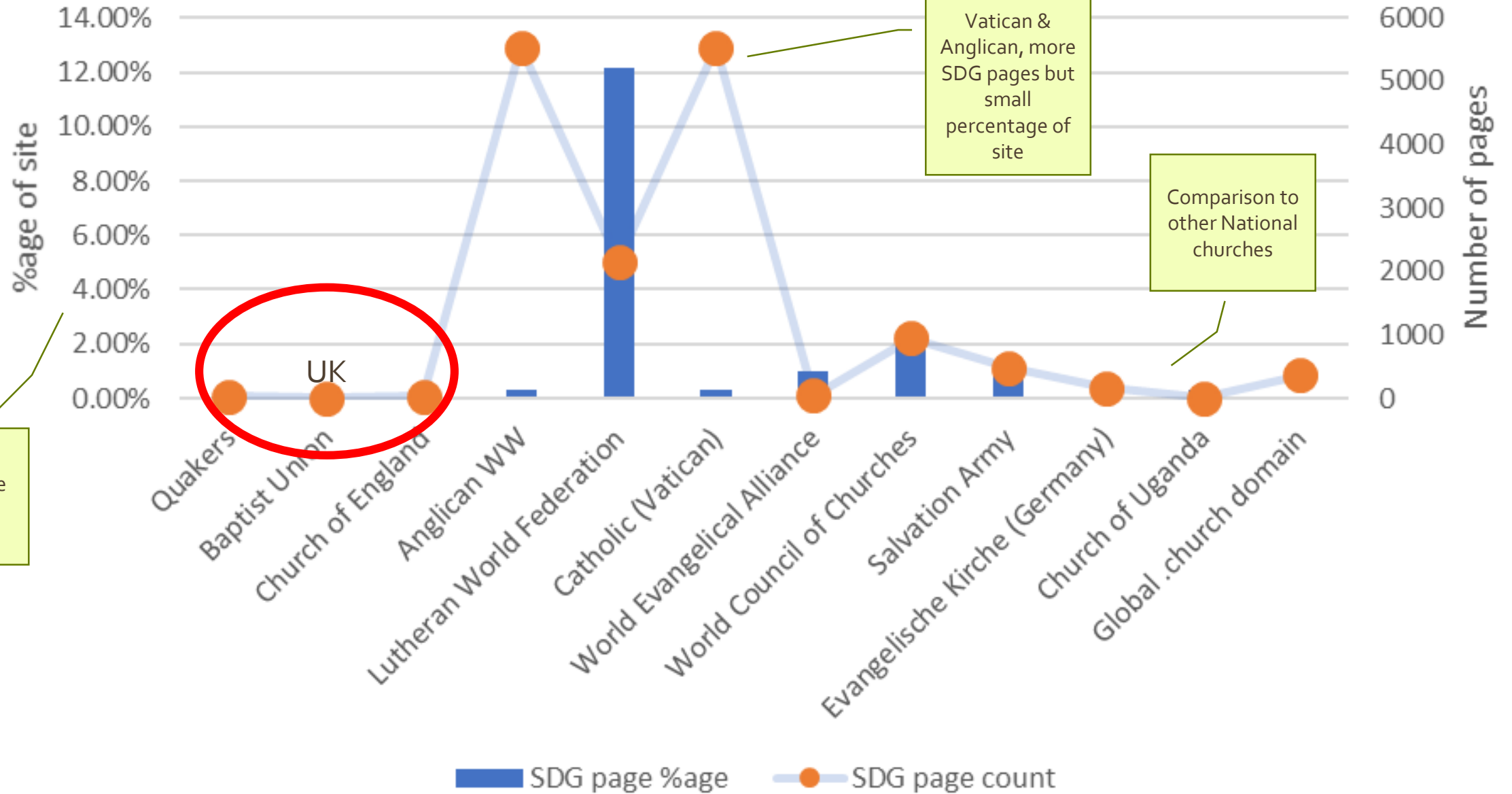
Method

1. Identify major Christian web domains from <https://ctbi.org.uk/member-churches/> and similar sources
2. Count number of web pages in domain mentioning SDG. Google search on “sustainable development goals” *site:churchdomain.org* take number of results from top of first page.
3. Count number of web pages in domain. Google search on *site:churchdomain.org* take number of results from top of first page.
4. Calculate percentage of site = (result of 2. / result of 3.) *100

Website engagement - Churches WW

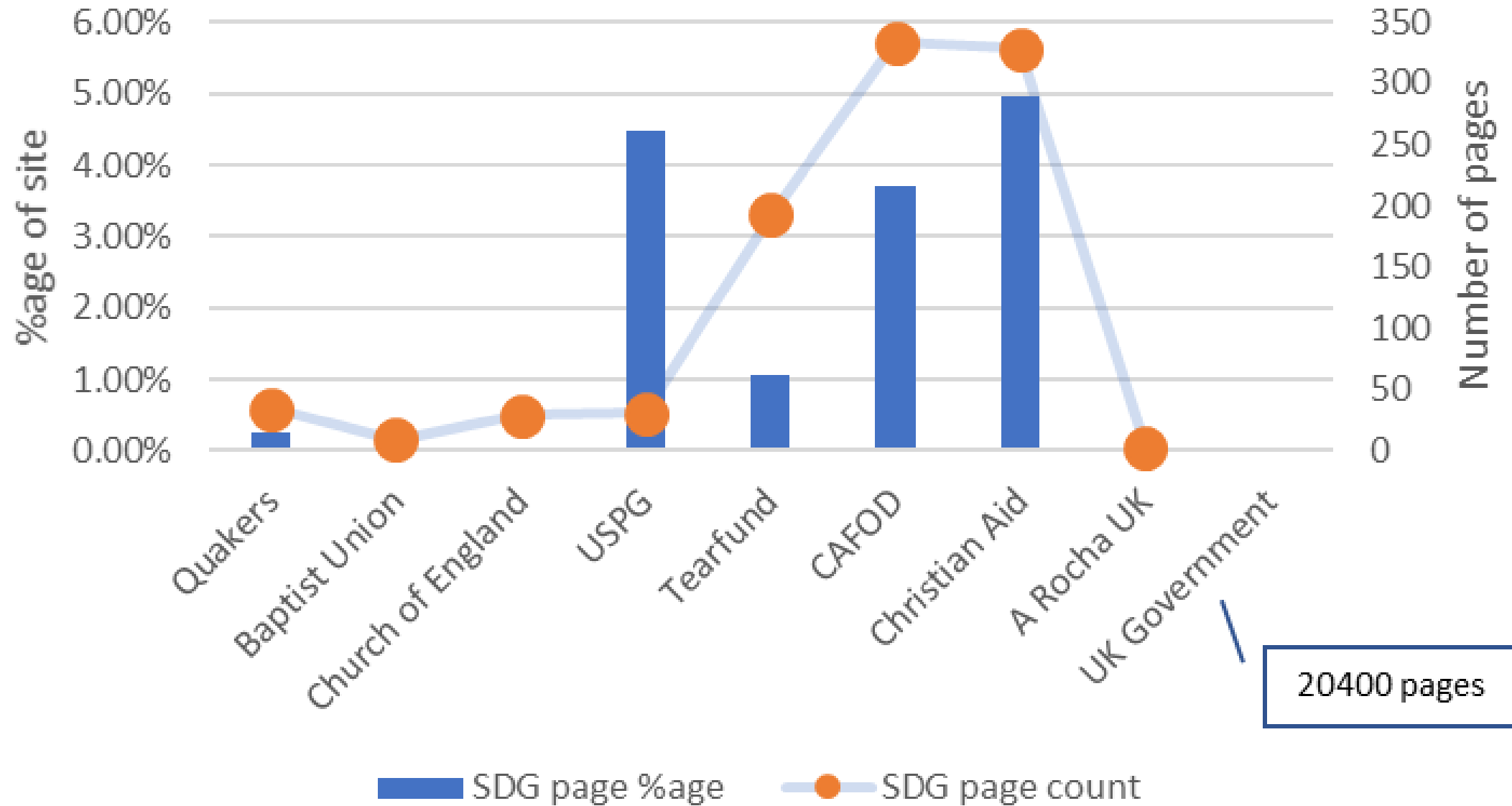


Note: change of axis scale

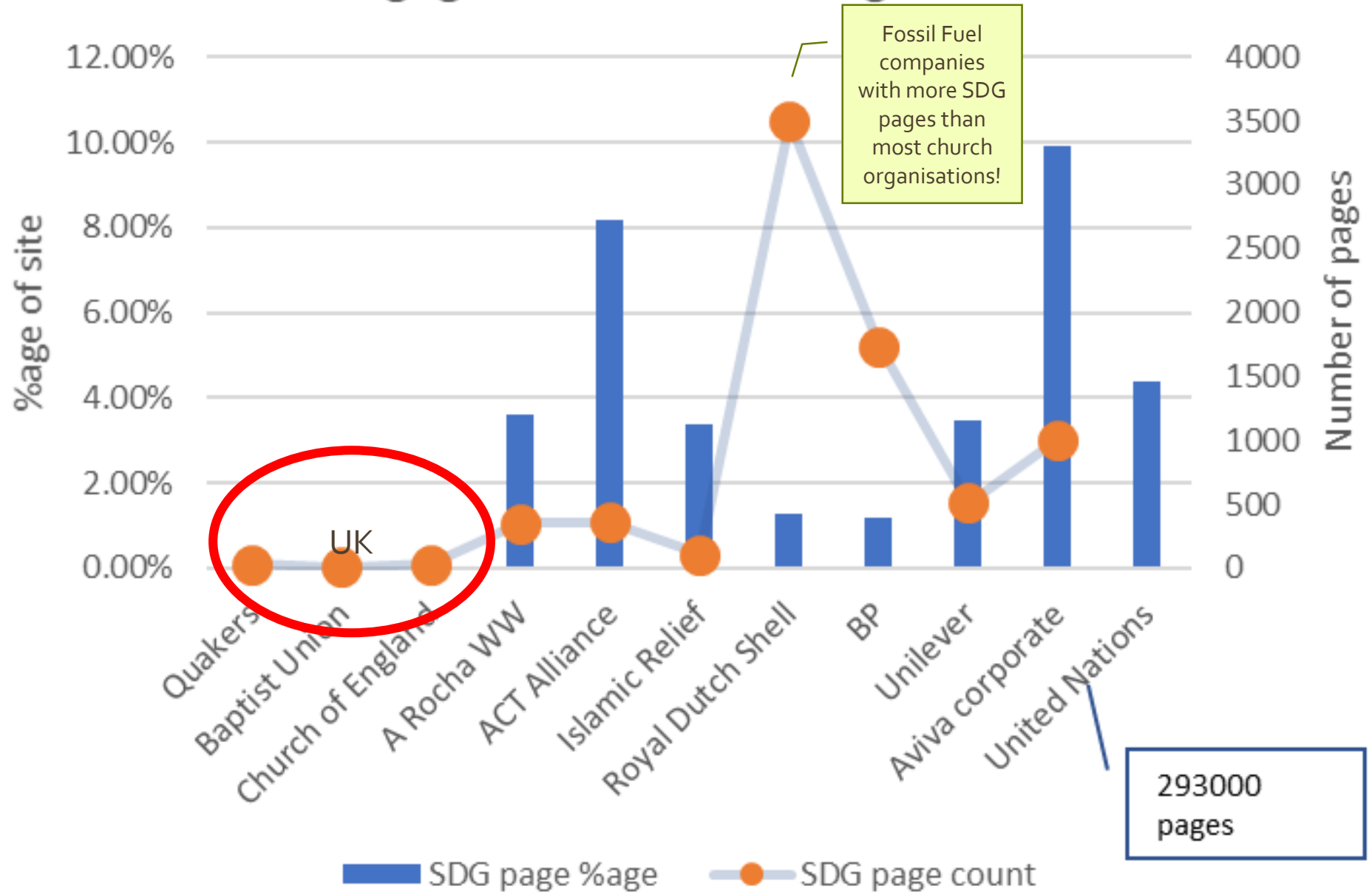
Vatican & Anglican, more SDG pages but small percentage of site

Website engagement - Other Organisations WW

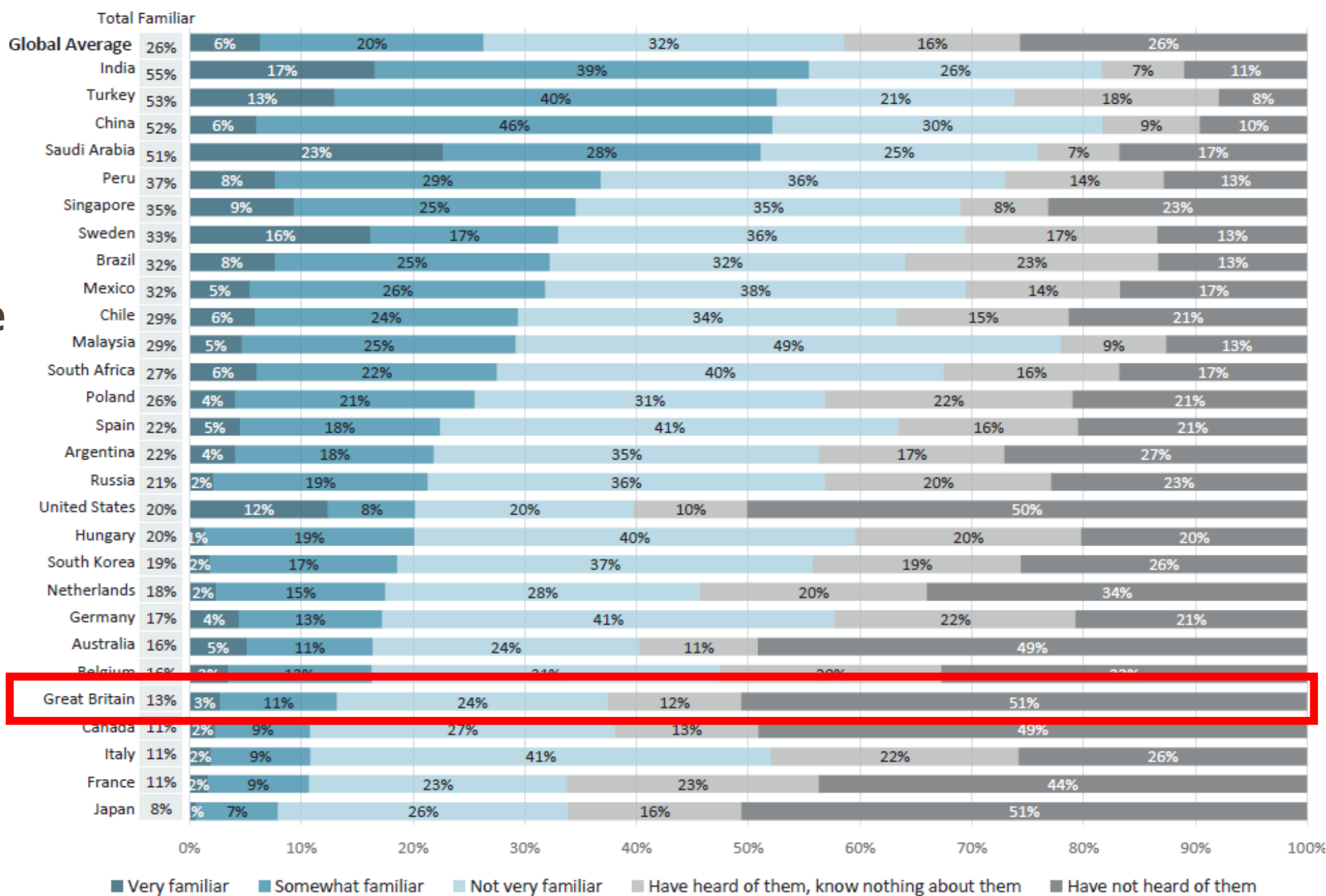




How familiar are you with the Sustainable Development Goals set by the United Nations?

Survey by Ipsos July / August 2019

Low SDG engagement by UK churches reflects low awareness in UK generally.



Overall themes

- Church social and environmental engagement already contributes to achieving SDGs
- Risk of instrumentalization of Faith Based Organisations
- Concerns are heard about ‘The Kingdom without the King’ / ‘Social Gospel’
- Wide variation in use of SDGs in church communications
- Faith-based Development Organisations and Churches delivering social care, *diakonia*, make more use of SDGs
- SDGs are a useful communication tool to express what Churches are doing and for engagement with secular organisations

Future questions

- Influence of national culture compared to influence of theology on Church engagement with SDGs?
- How to increase familiarity with SDGs, particularly in UK?
- Extent of actual activity by churches in UK when described with SDGs? (use method of Gas-Aixendri and Albareda-Tiana (2018))
