## Team update

## Overview of activities

### CRIS project

RBI has been conducting a project to acquire a Current Research Information System (CRIS, called a Project Information Management System (PIMS) at UWE Bristol) and has now chosen a supplier. This includes replacing the UWE Research Repository. This will be a major focus for the Repository Team for the next year.

### Animation

As part of the Student Success Services (SSS) all staff event, each team was tasked with creating a video giving an overview of their team activities. The Research Team elected to do this through an animated video rather than talking to a camera.



The animated video was created in Powtoon, featuring the voice talents of Lisa and Charley. It is available with subtitles [on Vimeo](#).

We have posted the video on the Research Team blog, and include a link to it in the Research Team introduction emails that are sent to new researchers.

## Thesis digitisation project

In the previous annual report there was mention of a project to digitise the hardcopy thesis collection held in the library. The project investigated the cost to digitise the entire thesis collection versus digitising a smaller amount (e.g. the most recent ten years.)

It was recommended that the current system (with users requesting access via Ethos, at which point the thesis is sent to the British Library for scanning) was retained. The project has now concluded.

## Research messages

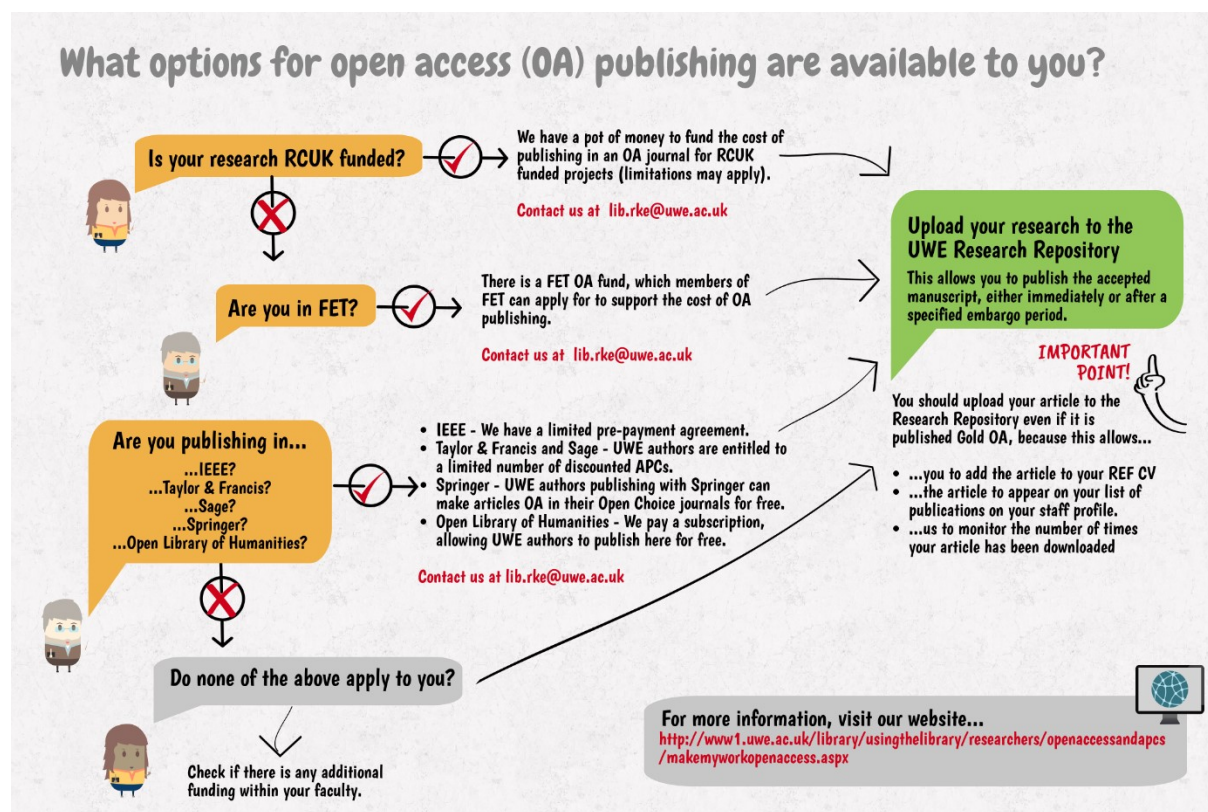
### Teaching and training

The Research Team offers one-to-one training on using the Research Repository – these can be arranged by request and are offered as an introductory meeting to new research staff.

The team carries out teaching within the Researcher Development Framework (RDF). Sessions consist of:

- Copyright in your thesis
- Searching the literature
- Research data management
- The academic publishing minefield

## Open access funding



We were requested by researchers to highlight the routes to publishing open access at UWE Bristol. In response, we created a new infographic showing the options available for both funded and non-funded researchers. This includes the fund provided by UKRI (previously RCUK) to pay article processing charges for research funded by the research councils, faculty specific funds, and offset deals that the library holds with certain publishers.

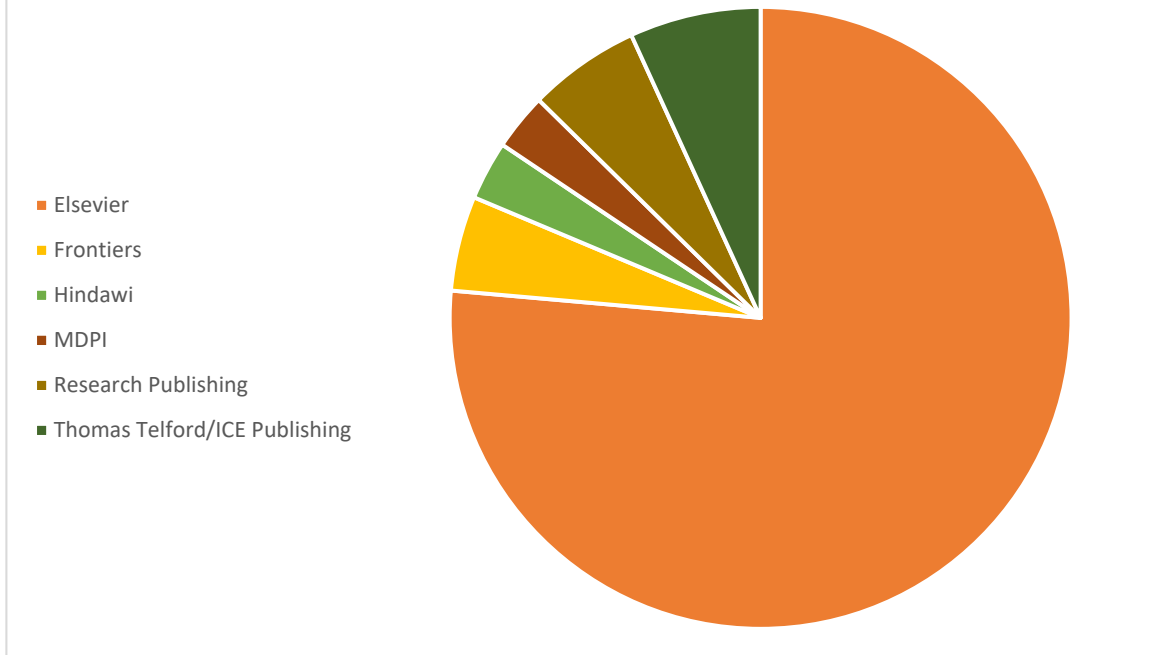
\*The Springer offset deal allows UWE Bristol authors to publish their articles open access free of charge in Springer Open Select journals. Of the 19 articles published, only two were in receipt of RCUK/UKRI funding, allowing 17 authors to publish immediately open access who had no other source of funding.

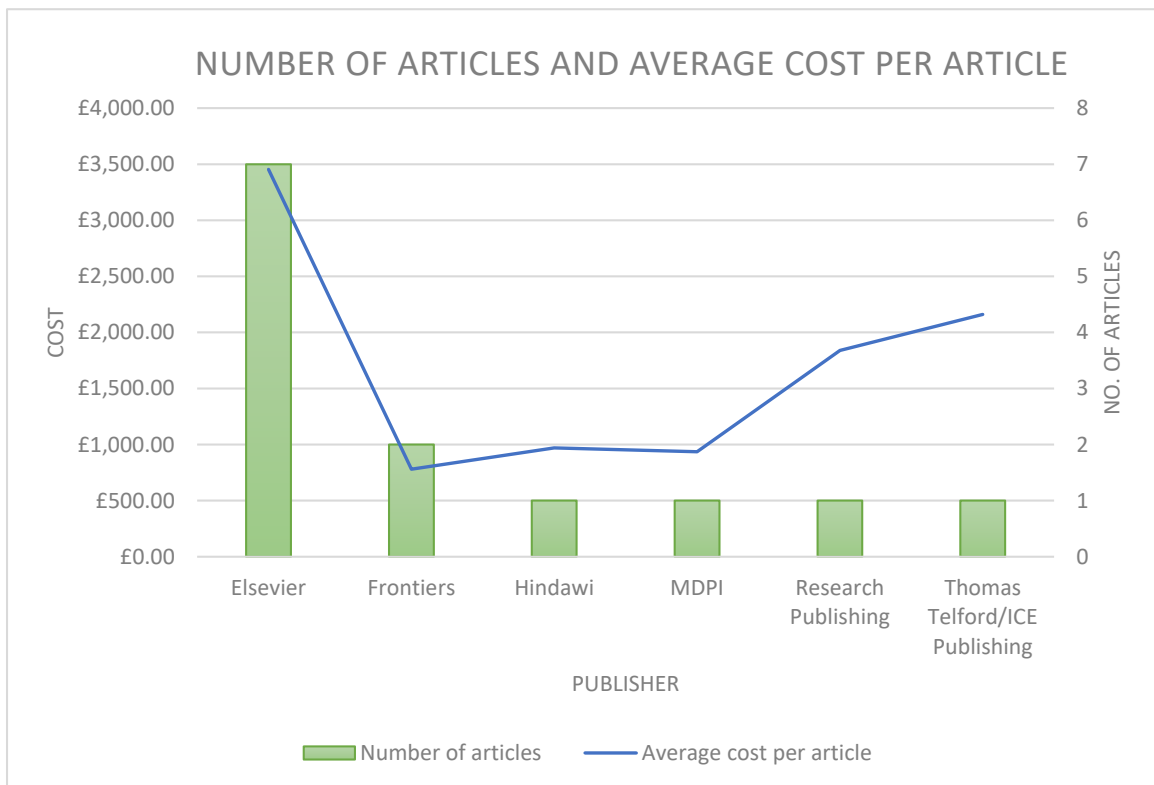

### TOTAL RCUK FUND SPEND AUG 17-JUL 18

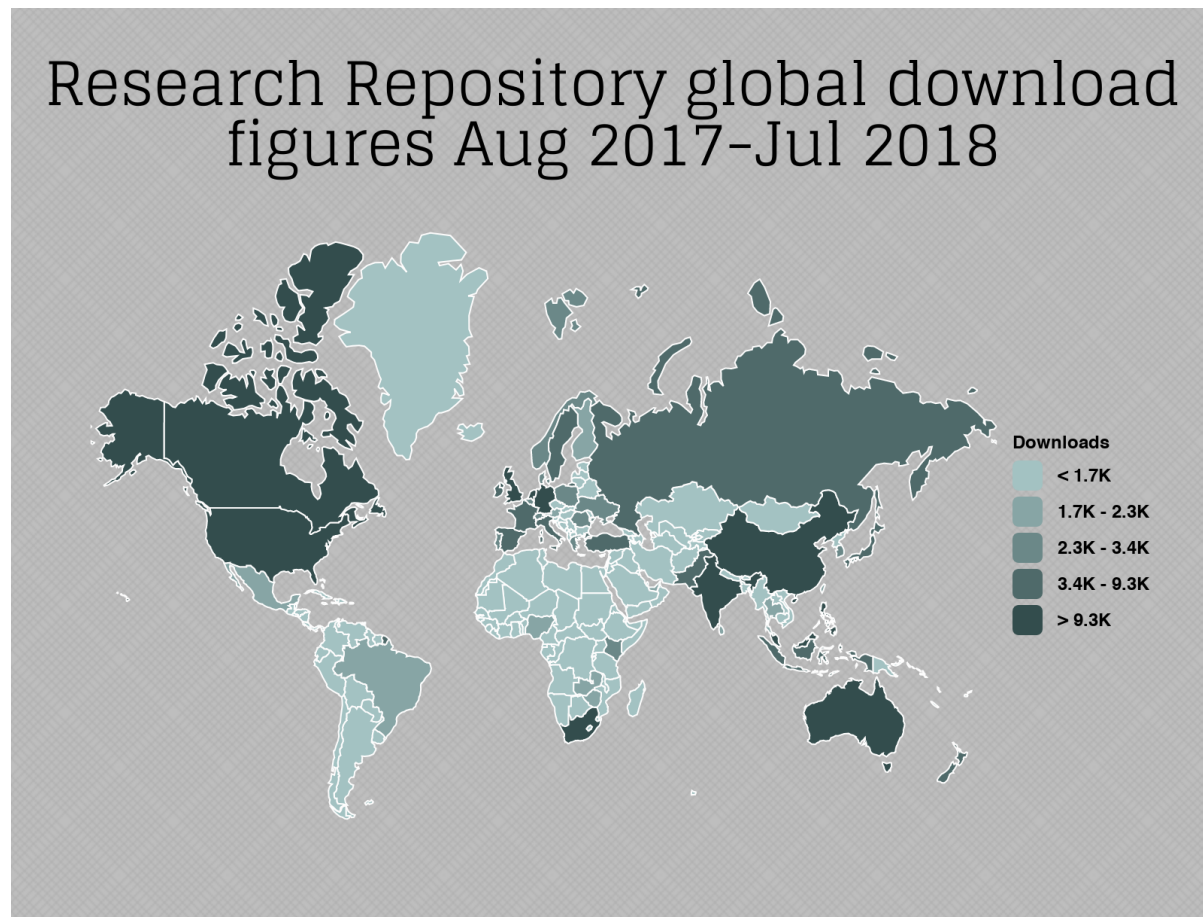


### NUMBER OF ARTICLES AND AVERAGE COST PER ARTICLE



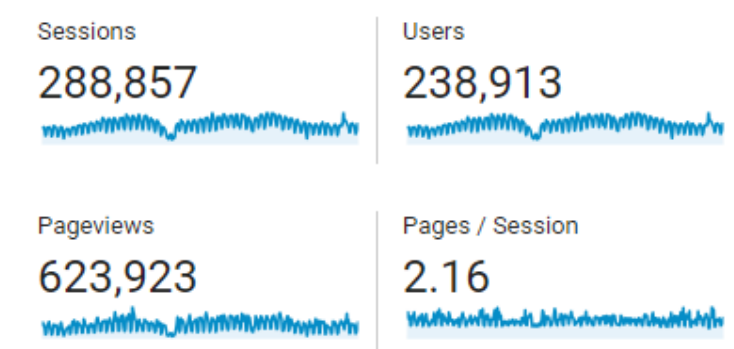

The map above displays the number of downloads from the Research Repository across the world over the period August 2017 – July 2018. The map with all figures visible can be accessed [on PiktoChart](#).

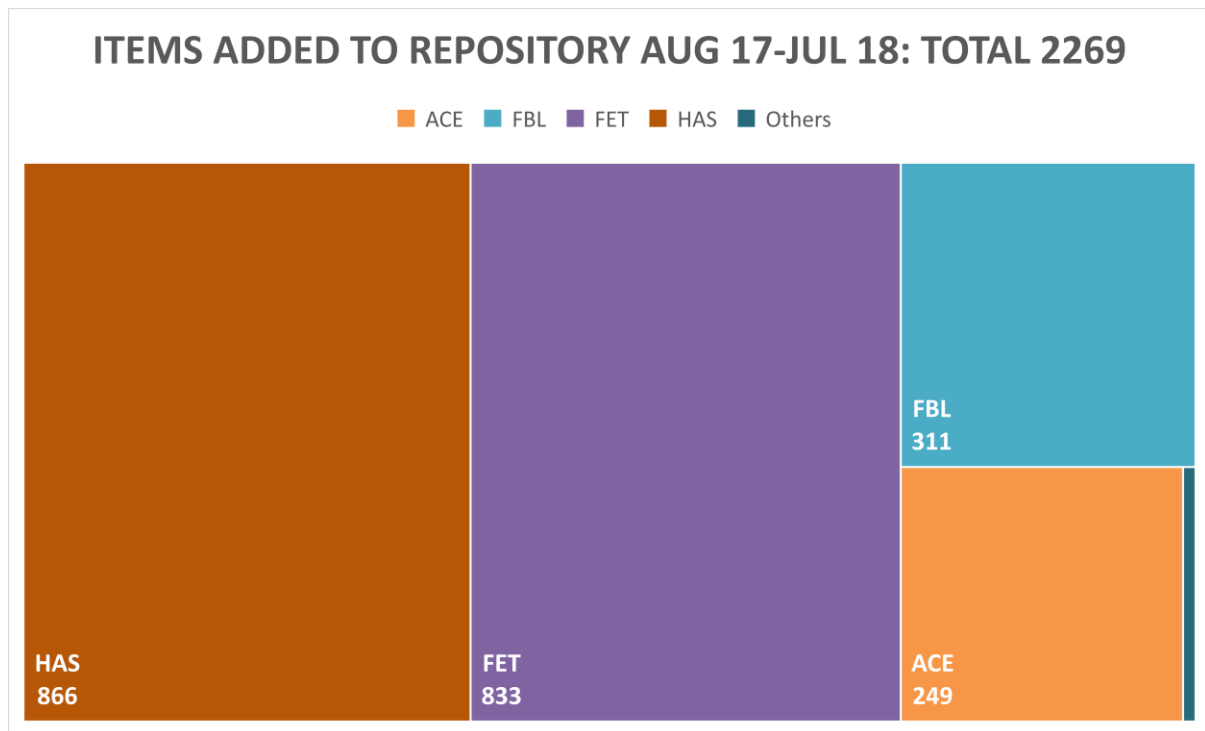
## Visitors to the Research Repository



The most visitors recorded on a single day was 1,218 on 14 July 2018. The fewest visitors recorded on a single day was 180 on 29 December 2017.

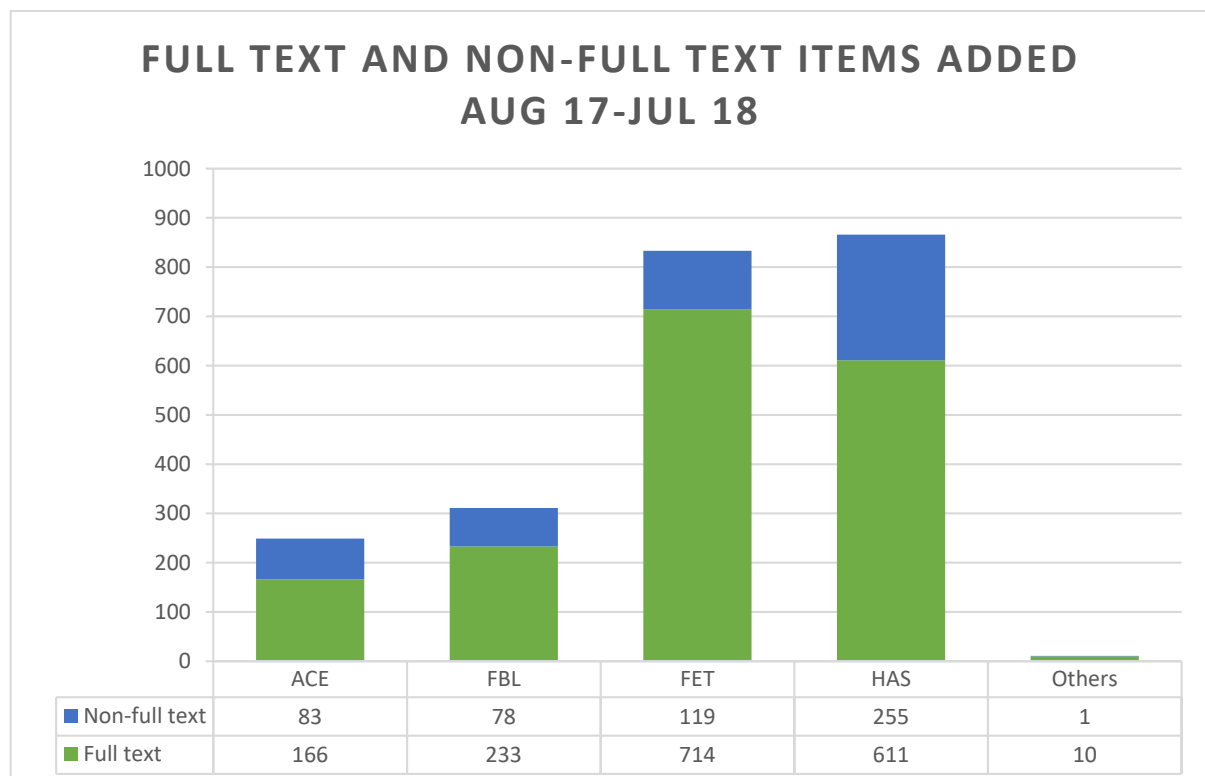


## Items added to the Research Repository by faculty



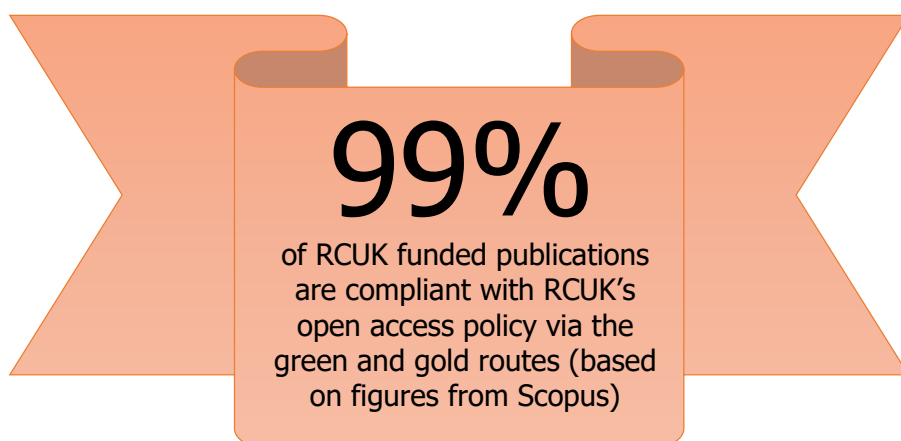
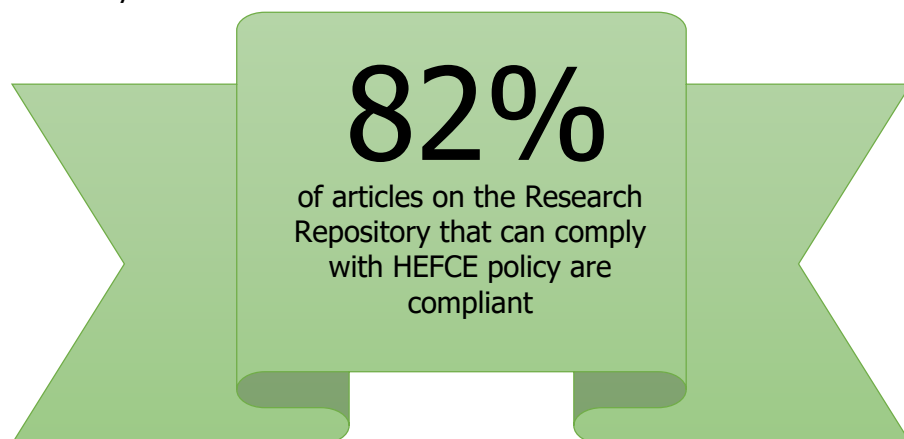

## Full text and non-full text



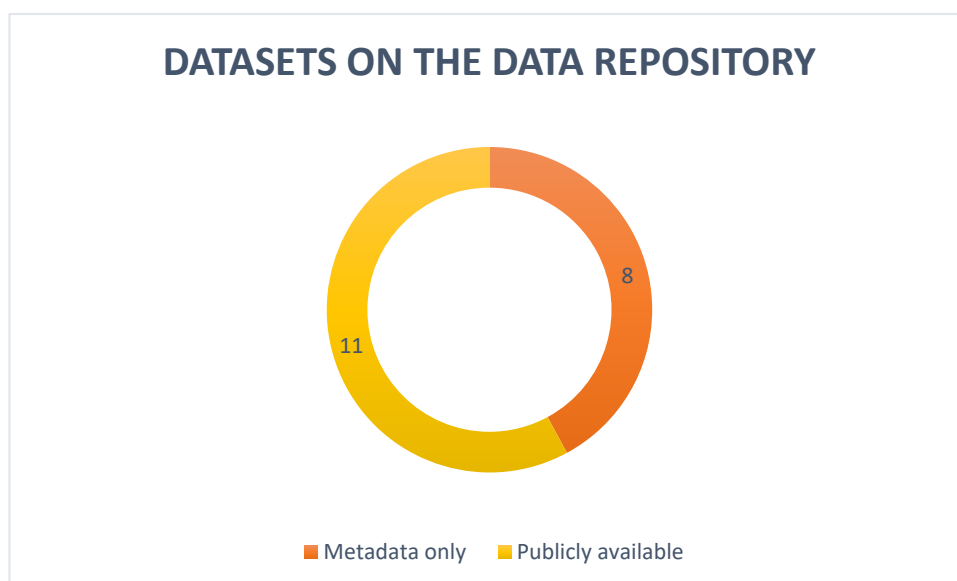
